As 2025 comes to a close, we're pausing with grateful hearts to reflect on a year filled with family, travel, milestones, medical challenges, and many reminders of God's steady care. It was a full year—in every sense of the word — and we're thankful for each chapter.

Along the way, we made room for fun and friendships. We enjoyed Swoop games, and Brenda treasured time with friends over many lunches — especially at Cooper's Hawk, Roots, Vivilore, Chicken Salad Chick, Iron Horse Inn, Magic Noodle, Xaboo Mephha, Chef Aristo's, Houlihan's, Whistle Stop, First Watch, Spice of Bombay — and, of course, many cups of coffee at Starbucks. Kim and Brenda also enjoyed meals together with friends at The Bristol, The Metropolitan at John Knox Village, Iron Horse Inn, Jose Peppers, Marina 27, Nicolas and Metropolitan Grill in Springfield, and Ziggy's Pizza West, in Wichita.

Sports continued to bring commentary and humor to our year. Brenda faithfully cheered on the Kansas City Chiefs, who made it to the Super Bowl, though hopes for a three-peat were dashed. With this season's playoff hopes now ended, we're trusting the draft for rebuilding. Kim's Chicago Bears are faring a bit better this season — but probably not for long (BKK). (Jealous – RKK)

On January 30, Kim drove to Clinton, MO (a little over an hour away) to golf at the <u>Meadow Lake Golf Course</u>. Needless to say, but he was the only person on the golf course and he really enjoyed the day. His streak of playing golf every month of every year we've lived in Missouri remained unbroken (150 months).

On January 31, Kim announced his retirement to his team and the rest of <u>John Knox Village</u>, but continued full steam ahead until his official retirement on May 1.

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We celebrated Kim's 70th birthday on February 1 at <u>Jasper's Italian</u> Restaurant — both a local favorite and one of our favorite spots for milestone celebrations — which prompted a call from Nick wondering how Kim could possibly be 70 (we are wondering how Nick could be turning 40 in

just days)!

Valentine's Day followed at <u>Cider House</u> (now known as Still Meadow), another favorite. We also attended the <u>Derby themed Chamber of Commerce Gala</u>, possibly our last costume event now that Kim has retired. We traveled to Wichita for Blair care in February and again in April, allowing Lindsay to work PRN while Blair enjoyed Mimi and Grandpa



Once again, the Ocala invasion occurred on March 4th, as Kim's family invaded his Uncle Larry's house in Ocala for 4-5 days of golf. Only five of us made the trip this year (Kim, Mark, Jimmy, Chris, and Karl). There is always a lot of banter as this group is very competitive, even though we are not that good at golf. Larry and Kay are saints for opening their home and putting up with us for five days.

Behind the scenes, we began the very time-consuming and ongoing process of Medicare research, weighing Original vs. Advantage plans and drug coverage, made more complex by changes during open enrollment. Given Brenda's medical needs — including costly glaucoma prescriptions, orthopedic concerns, and preventative care — careful decisions were essential. Brenda also received several steroid knee injections throughout the year, with knee replacement likely in the not-too-distant future.

March and May marked significant medical chapters for Brenda. A diagnostic procedure in March confirmed endometrial cancer, followed by surgery at KUMED on May 19. All cancer was successfully removed, and no further treatment was required. An eight-week recovery period followed, along with a two-year monitoring protocol. We are deeply grateful for excellent medical care, faithful prayer, and the meals and encouragement provided by friends and our church family as Brenda was recovering.

In the spring, Kim was winding down his work activities as he participated in the <u>Caring Communities</u> <u>Annual Member Meeting in Half Moon Bay, California</u> in early April which included (of course) golf.



On May 1st, his retirement was celebrated by the JKV staff and residents along with colleagues from organizations he worked closely with over the years. After he retired in May, his weekly golf routine from the Tuesday late-afternoon league at Fred Arbanas Golf Course to adding "Old Guys" golf on Mondays at Hoots Hollow, and rotating courses around the metro on Wednesdays. As Brenda recovered at home, Kim was able to travel to San Antonio with friends for an amazing golf event at Briggs Ranch, followed shortly by the annual Bella Vista golf outing with Lee's Summit friends in early June.

We also celebrated his retirement by traveling to Branson, enjoying golf at <u>Payne's Valley</u>, <u>Nature at Night</u> adventure where you drive your own golf cart along a 2.5-mile trail featuring lights, waterfalls, bridge crossings, and a cave at <u>Top of the Rock</u>. We also saw a performance of <u>"David"</u> at <u>Sight & Sound</u>, and a bluegrass concert by <u>The Petersons</u>, who have become a favorite.





Mother's Day weekend brought the entire family together in Lee's Summit to celebrate Kim's retirement and milestone birthday — cousins playing together, backyard and park time, a Sunday family gathering and photos, and a memorable visit to the Kansas City Zoo and Aquarium.

Brenda also enjoyed seeing <u>Alison Krauss and Union Station at Starlight Theatre</u> — wonderful music, though we left early due to thunderstorms (outdoor amphitheater).



With medical clearance (and strict instructions that Brenda lift no luggage!), we traveled in July to Charleston, South Carolina, staying at HGVC Liberty Place. We explored the city on foot and by Uber, enjoyed many restaurants, visited Fort Sumter by ferry (part of the National Park Service), took a horse-drawn carriage tour of historic Charlston, shopped City Market, watched Patriot's Point Fourth of July fireworks from Pineapple Fountain at Waterfront Park, and visited Magnolia Plantation Gardens and the Charleston Museum. Kim even fit in a round of golf at the Charleston Municipal Golf Course. Not to mention the wonderful food – not enough

time to scratch the surface of all the dining opportunities. Kim played great new course called <u>Finkbine Golf Course</u> where the Iowa State Golf Team Course was practicing. Before the reunion, we visited the <u>Leon cemetery</u> where many Klockenga ancestors, including the earliest, Harm and Sena, are buried.



Later in August, we headed back to Branson for a complimentary stay at Stonebridge Village, enjoying golf at Ledgestone Country Club (Kim), the Haygoods Music Show, Bass Pro's Wonders of Wildlife National Museum and Aquarium (highly recommend), dinner with friends in Springfield at Nicola's Ristorante, and a memorable Cody Johnson concert at Thunder Ridge Nature's Area near Branson.

Labor Day weekend followed in Wichita where we enjoyed some down time before baby James' arrival including a trip to <u>Botanica Gardens Wichita</u>. Kim helped Daniel with some home projects and golfed with Daniel and Chris.

September included a cherished family vacation to Hilton Head Island, staying again at Coral Sands Resort with Nick, Kat, and the girls. We loved the three-bedroom layout, proximity to the beach, and nearby Low Country Celebration Park, which features a playground named after the ship Captain William Hilton was on when he discovered Hilton Head Island. It features a reimagined design of the ship, playground, wading pool and more. Brenda and Kim enjoyed reconnecting with Brenda's former Michigan (ROLM/IBM/Siemens) colleagues and spouses at Sunset Grill. One of the highlights was Brenda and Kat took Eleanor and Audrey to the Pirates of Hilton Head adventure. They dressed in their pirate gear and received props and face painting before the adventure commenced – including shooting water cannons at a rival pirate boat! Nick and Kim golfed a couple rounds at Bear Creek Golf Course and The Shipyard Golf Course.



One of the greatest joys of the year arrived on September 21 at 3:00 a.m. - James George, the first grandson of eight grandchildren, weighing in at almost 9 pounds and measuring 22½ inches. In early October, we traveled to Wichita to meet him in person. Family lore now includes the story of Uncle Chris (AKA Uncle Christmas) and his friend Miguel being called in overnight to watch Blair for a few hours before reinforcements (Lindsay's parents) arrived — and Chris being "fatigued" the next day (cue the eye rolls).

Usually, our letter contains updates from each son/family, but we're still waiting! Hopefully the update comes soon and we can update this letter with details and pictures!


This much we know:
